Chairman's Statement

2020 has been an extraordinary year, sadly not for many positive reasons from a cricketing perspective, as most of our season was lost to the tragic circumstances of the Covid 19 crisis. This curtailed our season from April to mid-July, when we were finally allowed to resume recreational cricket, for a five game adult cricket season, re-named the August Cup and our junior and women's section were also able play a decent number of matches.

Despite the shortened season, I am extremely proud to say that the volunteers who are the absolute heart and soul of our club, once again stood up and worked as hard as ever, if not harder, to ensure that we were able to provide some cricket and training for our members of all ages. Chichester Priory Park Cricket Club is deeply indebted to the incredible work done by Matthew and Richard Geffen to get Goodwood safely re-opened for pre-season nets and have pitches ready for play when we began with our inter-club friendly, where all four adult teams were in action.

From a financial perspective I am pleased to say that the club remains in a sound position. Not least due to the tireless efforts of Ben Hubbard as Treasurer who maintains a watchful eye over all aspects of club finances. We are indebted to Goodwood Estate and Rathbones for their continued support of our club. Rathbones sponsorship of junior festival cricket and newly formed Chichester Lionesses, who played in the women's August Cup Softball league was invaluable. We look forward to continuing our burgeoning relationship with Rathbone's next year and long into the future. To ensure no financial hardship to our membership, we made the decision to waive membership fees in 2020 and simply charged for matches played and the utilisation of our nets at Goodwood for coaching sessions, which provided a great opportunity for outdoor activity in the early days when full lockdown measures were lifted and we were allowed to congregate in small groups.

Senior Division

In a normal year, I would provide some commentary on the performance of the four Senior Saturday league teams, but this seems less relevant this year as the focus of our attention was to maximize participation and to give younger players the opportunity to play at a higher level to give them a taste of a higher standard of cricket that they may not have seen in a more 'normal' season. This process was driven by the forward thinking nature of our new 1st XI captain Sean Dobbs who continued to give great support to the club in so many ways, captaining, coaching and organizing the club's on field activities in conjunction with the other captains Peter Lamb, Graeme Bennison, James Mayne and David Baily.

As with every season, however short, there is no cricket without the support of umpires and scorers. I would like to thank everybody who scored or umpired matches throughout the season and especially to Bryan Tomalin who, as always, gave up an enormous amount of his personal time as both Fixture & Umpire Secretary and on field umpire.

Junior Division

The junior section of our club continues to flourish under the tremendous leadership of James Mayne and Sean Dobbs and a host of team managers who oversaw a very successful season. Since I joined the club in 2014 the progress that the junior section has made has been truly remarkable. My son Ben barely played in a team that won any games when he first joined the club, but this year the under 19 team in which he played with his ever present mate and co-captain Sam Price lost out on reaching the final of the Sussex Festival Cup by a decimal point, caused by a rain out in their first game, prior to winning all their remaining fixtures. This represents an astonishing turnaround and is a tribute to James and Sean and also in no small part to the improvement of a number of players, who have worked hard individually and also benefitted from playing adult cricket, starting in our 4th XI under the watchful eye of Andrew 'Boss' Barnes. Boss handed over to David Bailly this year and it was no surprise to me that David's son Tom deservedly won the Robin Pine Trophy for best young cricketer in 2020, as well as picking up the 4th XI player of the season award. Such has been the progress of our youngsters that we were able to field a 5th XI team this season, which would have been captained by another club stalwart Jes Goode and given his very talented son Arran his first vitally important taste of adult cricket, had inclement weather not intervened and washed out the entire fixture. Going forward, it is our intention to add a 5th team on a Saturday in 2021. We believe the depth of available players in adult, junior and women's divisions, will make it possible to create a new and sustainable team that can enjoy and benefit from an introduction to league cricket.

Women/Girls Division

Women's cricket took a giant stride forward in 2020 with more than 20 participants enjoying regular training sessions overseen by the 2020 winner of the Dyer Quake award for club person of the year, Matt Geffen. The newly formed Lionesses won two of their four completed league games and played a full part in two very enjoyable cricket softball festivals at Arundel Castle and Middleton. I remain very enthusiastic about the role women's cricket will play in the club's future development and we have very ambitious plans to drive this forward in the future and make Chichester the 'go to ' club for women and girls in West Sussex. Anna Scriven-Wood, who also plays for Sussex is another example of young talent that has developed in our junior ranks under the leadership of James and Sean.

The Future

Whilst I am delighted to report that we have made great strides on the field, I must also note that I am very conscious of the need to keep our club fully inclusive of all standards of players. We must strive to encourage everyone to believe that their sons and daughters will get every chance to participate in a full and appropriate way when they join Chichester, otherwise we will have failed in our mission to provide cricket for players of all abilities in an inclusive, friendly and objective way that respects the integrity of the game. That is not to say that we are unambitious, nothing could be further from the truth, but Chichester has long been a club of integrity and renowned for playing the game in the correct spirit and I believe we can achieve all our goals without straying from this mantra.

We are also continuing to drive forward a plan to improve the club's facilities. We have draft plans in place for the renovation of the White Pavilion in Priory Park, which we intend to submit to the council shortly. I am greatly indebted to both Simon Hasted and Nathaniel Gee for the work they have put into this project and hope to be able to report on further progress in the near future. In addition, we hope to improve the training facilities at Goodwood over the winter to significantly enhance both one on one and group training. This is also pending Goodwood Estate approval.

Committee Retirement

I would like to draw everyone's attention to the retirement of Jan Barnes, as club Membership and Welfare Officer. Jan has done so much work for the club for circa 35 years including as Chairperson of the club as we as well as scoring innumerable matches with her legendary coloured pens and drawing of a small duck to signify an unfortunate dismissal for nought, which I have seen in the score book against my own name far too often. Jan is a remarkable person who typifies the spirit of Chichester in every way, selflessly giving her time for the club and being upbeat and encouraging around all teams and members, even in the face of the heaviest of defeats. Jan intends to stay involved with scoring and supporting the committee and I want to thank her on behalf of the whole club for her incredible contribution.

Conclusion

I would be being disingenuous if I said I had enjoyed my third year of Chairmanship of the club, having thoroughly enjoyed the first two years. 2020 was extremely challenging, requiring more administration than ever for considerably less cricket. However, I can say I am incredibly proud to have been involved with so many dedicated people who gave up a huge amount of time to play a relatively small number of games, when it would have been far easier to draw stumps on the season.

I intend to continue as Chairman of Chichester next season, should I be re-elected, and look forward to 2021 being more normal. We have very ambitious plans with respect to an overseas player, Irish ex professional James Shannon, who is scheduled to come over in April and alongside the considerable talent he offers as a player, is also going to enhance our already excellent coaching staff with a special emphasis on women's cricket. Current Covid uncertainty makes predicting how next season will take shape very difficult, but we will be making every effort to provide a full season of cricket next year.

Financial Report Summary

- The club recorded a gain of £156 for the 12m ending 31 October 2020.
- This was a small improvement on last's years loss of £501.
- 2020 was a highly unusual season with almost all aspects of the clubs' activities impacted by COVID-19 and associated Government policies designed to limit the spread of the disease.
- From a financial perspective, the key events/policies were:
 - Waiving of all subscription fees for the year with player contributions being limited to match fees.
 - o Significantly reduced number of matches and training.
 - Cancellation of cricket week.
- The club continues to be well capitalised with around £35k in the bank.

2nd XI - Season Report

It's not often the first ball of the season can be a metaphor for the remainder. "Peggy at the top of his mark with a steely look in his eye, just like the rest of the second XI after being cooped up over recent months and of course with the intention of getting one up on the 1st XI. He charges up the hill, bounds and delivers. 'HOOOOOWWWWSSSSS TTHAAATTTTTTT?????!!!!' Echoes around the splendid surroundings of Goodwood. A trademark in-swinging Yorker from the big man, looked to have struck the unsuspecting Matt Sharp's big toe in front of all three uprights and perhaps this is what ended up saving him, NOT OUT." Similar to many of our games this year close but just not quite close enough.

I have found in the past Interclub games to be a shade lack luster, but not this season. The contest was on and at 25 for 3 the 1st XI were in the second teams sights and things could have gone our way, after Tim Wergen (100 retired) was not dropped in the gully early in his innings and the opposition skipper Sean Dobbs (61 Retired) edged though a vacant third slip that was manned just the ball before, while still in single figures. Terrific batting ensued from the two of them and the ball went to all parts pushing the score onto 255 for 6 off 35 over. This was nothing against the efforts from a new look and young bowling attack the pick of which being Andrew Crookham (2 for 39 off 7) and Eliot Scott (2 for 32 off 7) both of which play for the 1's during the season with the latter after his performance playing the rest of the season in the 1's. 255 was always going to be a big ask, against a strong bowling attack. Some fluid shots from Will Futcher (24) a dogged and gritty effort from Jonathan Maynard (22) showed how much he valued his wicket, a great quality to have. A couple of lusty blows from Ed McCarthy (15) towards the latter of the innings took us to 118 for 8 off our 35 overs, a performance with plenty of positives to take from it and forward into the season.

We had one more game before the August Cup against Stirlands 1st XI and it was the first feather in our caps with a comprehensive victory. After winning the toss and electing to bat a poised innings from Will Price (37) got us off to a decent start C. Futcher, J. Maynard and P. Lamb all got into the twenties and Jez Goode (44*) saw us to a respectable 183 for 8 off 40 overs. Now it was over to the bowlers and it was almost over before it had begun with early wickets for both A. Pegg (3 for 33 off 6) and A. Crookham (3 for 28 off 8) well supported in the field especially with an absolute worldly at gully from Olly Troy. There was even a request from Stirlands to have a second innings at one point, they where finally all out for 129 and a good first win of the season.

Our first game of the August cup was away against Worthing 2nd XI and post lockdown teething issues clearly evident with the opposition, just emphasizing the amazing work from Richard Geffen and his team. After losing the toss a confident opposition captain elected to bat. It was clear why, as he come out to open the batting and proceeded to have harder hands than I allegedly have. Worthing passed 100 with the loss of just one wicket, cometh the hour cometh the Jonty Stanford. After seeing the ball disappearing to all parts, the job at hand was a toughie and all that hard work in preseason training came off with the perfect inswinging yorker to dismiss the opposition skipper and was the turning point of the game. As a tremendous team effort was able to restrict Worthing to just 200. A terrific maiden 2nd Team fifty for Will Price picking up where he left off against Stirlands, gave us a great start. Ed McCarthy (31*) hit a six so big it almost went on to the adjacent square luckily their game had finished, before handing over the reins to Ezaz Safi (53*) who decided to finish the game off with a six over extra cover to bring up his fifty. Resulting in a win with 11.4 overs to spare.

Moving on to arguably our hardest game of the season Chippingdale's 1st XI on what I believe was one of the hottest days I've ever played cricket. Definitely a day to win the toss and bat, which the

opposition skipper promptly did happily. The large frame of Alex Pegg struggled initially with the combination of bowling up hill and heat, but came back strongly at the end to finish with 4 for 33 off his 7 overs. Alex Lowther (2 for 15 off 7) a new addition to the attack, bowled extremely well up front with little reward for the skill on show. Finding the edge through to the keeper to be turfed, followed up by what could be classed as an identical delivery this time firmly in the grips of Ed McCarthy much to his relief. The heat was to play a further factor losing Sam Price to heat stoke on just his third over. The efforts of Stanford (1 for 55 off 7), P. Lamb (1 for 31 off 5 'up the hill') and the added experience of Dan Joseph (2 for 28 off 7) was good enough to restrict Chippingdale's to 221. A tremendous effort from the whole team to keep them to a very gettable score, however J. Goode (16) was the only one to get into double figures in the top six. The rear-guard action now commenced with Ed McCarthy (65) and Alex Lowther (58) taking the game to them and resulting in us needing 11 off the final over with one wicket remaining, A. Pegg struck a four down the ground before a controversial incident resulting in J. Stanford being run out and Chichester being all out for 215. An amazing effort against a strong side and odds stacked against us it was a great learning experience for sure.

In stark contrast from the heat of the previous week we played Middleton 2nd XI in one of the wettest games I've ever played in. Winning the toss and after losing an early wicket, both Lamb (29) and Goode (42) looked to get to work of setting a platform and at 102 for 4 it could have gone either way. Will Futcher struggled at the start of his innings but was able to find his feet while Ed McCarthy (62*) continued his run of fine form at the other end. Futcher got better and better and was a fine display of batting with even some very good ramp shots. He finished on 71* and took us to a very respectable 238 for 4 off our 40 overs. Patches of drizzle from the dark sky that plagued Chichester's inning looked set to continue and even get worse. Something Middleton realized might come into the game, as even with 2 early wickets from Ben Gregory (2 for 32 off 5) they came out hard to get in ahead of the game and we found ourselves behind for the majority of Middleton innings. With the weather getting worse, the ball could only be described as a bar of soap and how both J. Maynard and W. Futcher were able to bowl spin with it is nothing short of a miracle. Lamb (3 for 37 off 6) bowled well in the difficult conditions, but it was inevitable the drizzle finally turn into rain and players had to leave the field of play. Resulting in Middleton narrowly winning via Duckworth Lewis method having had the better of the conditions on the day.

Taking some valuable lessons learned so far this season into what was to be the 2nd XI's final game of the season against West Wittering 1st XI, we set about putting them into practice. A. Crookham and B. Gregory were patient and supported each other well with the new ball resulting with 2 well-earned wickets for Gregory (3 for 29 off 7). Sam Price (1 for 35 off 8) bowled extremely well in the middle overs and was rewarded with his first 2nd XI wicket, I'm sure first of many. Lamb (2 for 24 from 4) with a double wicket madden followed by A. Crookham (3 for 18 from 8) came back to mop up the tail with his array of slower balls, resulting in West Wittering being all out for 175. A tricky total to chase on an interesting wicket, several batsmen got in and out in some interesting ways and Greg French (16) looked to be a solid addition to the middle order and team overall. However, with some senior top order players now patrolling the boundary nervously it was time for the young guns to step up. We said after the Chippingdale's game the key is to take it deep and give ourselves every opportunity to win, Gregory (30) struck the ball well and J. Maynard (12) made sure we had a chance with the tail slowly ebbing away. It came to the last over, 3 need to win and 2 wickets remaining. Dot, Dot, One Run, WICKET, WICKET. Close but just not quite close enough as we lost by just a single run.

What a season for the 2nd XI, I really cannot fault any of the efforts from all those who played this season. I believe everyone showed heart and grit they should be hugely proud. This was my first

season captaining a Chichester team and I can honestly say I enjoyed every bit of it. I cannot thank enough all those who played for the 2nd XI this season and all those who helped me both on and off the field to make it such an enjoyable process. So thank you and I am looking forward to doing it all again next year!

3rd XI - Season Report

The season started with 2 friendly matches. A win against the 4th XI and a loss to Bognor. Losing skipper Graeme Bennison and Guy Montgomery to injury after only 1 league game was far from ideal and did mean that the team lacked Graeme's leadership and steady batting as well the team's principal bowler. James Mayne took over as skipper for the remaining 4 games but was slightly hampered by a finger injury throughout.

Apart from a debacle at Bognor where the team was dismissed for 23 on a wet one, the batting held up reasonably well. 191 at Stirlands, with Glen Stanford making 91 was a decent enough score but still resulted in a loss by 6 wickets and 4.3 overs to spare.

Asked to field first on a sweltering hot day in Priory Park was not ideal against Petworth Park and they amassed 286 for 3 off 40 overs. This would have been a lot lower had catches been taken. In reply, good contributions from French, Hubbard, Toft and both Maynes along with a Martyn Collins fifty got us to win 9 runs without really looking like winning.

Following the disappointment of Bognor the team were determined to put things right against Arundel. A better bowling performance restricted Arundel to 181 for 8. A fantastic debut by 13 year old Harry Walker who bowled with excellent pace and control and finished with figures of 2 for 8 off his 7 overs. Good spin bowling by Toby Toft (2 for 15) Stanley Mayne (1 for 36) showed promising signs for the future. In response excellent batting by new member Alex Burrows (38) and a fine hundred by Will Parker got us home with 7 overs remaining and only 2 down.

The final game was at a windy Selsey. Despite a good opening spell by Harry Walker and Martyn Collins the Selsey batters had a day out at the expenses of the young spinners and the skipper. 254 was a tall order to chase and 190 was a fair effort in response. Ben Hubbard made 37, Mohan 45 and Martyn Collins 44 not out.

Ben Hubbard topped the run scoring with 178 runs, he was followed by Will Parker (163), Glen Stanford (144), Martyn Collins (123) and Toby Toft (114). The lack of wickets (sometimes down to poor catching) was the main reason the team struggled. Toby Toft finished with 5 wickets, Harry and Stanley 3 each. Despite the best efforts of Martyn Collins who bowled with great heart every week he only managed 3 wickets.

Although the results were disappointing then the young players (especially the spin twins of Toft and Mayne) will benefit enormously from the overs bowled and the experience. Harry Walker has proved he is an exciting prospect for next season and with more young players pushing up and the return of some more experienced heads then the prospects of the team remain bright.

We were lying second in the table up until the last match, when the pressure may have got to us a bit when playing Middleton Academy, the strongest team in our division.
